You can use pattern chaining to cue up patterns to be played after each other in a loop, like a simple live sequencer for patterns. In PATTERN mode, hold a button and then press the keys corresponding to the patterns you want to chain. The patterns will be chained in the order you select them. It is only possible to chain patterns from one bank, and each pattern may only be chained once. Chaining is indicated by a double arrow between the current and the next pattern.

Just wanted to add some clarity on the pattern linking feature. You can in fact link more than 2 patterns together to create a longer phrase in pattern mode. This is great for breaking out of the 2 - 4 bar structure. Simply hold down the bank button of choice and at the same time hold down as many pattern selection buttons as you want (I tested it up to 8 but it looks like you could do more.)

If you start with empty patterns this will give you a longer pattern to work with. Hit record and you can record through all the pattern changes.

When programming p-locks over 2 chained 2bar patterns, if you take yr time fine tuning the value it ends up setting the same value to the same step on both of the 2bar patterns....and hence they sound the same. I did this whilst programming a Midi machine so don't know if this is the same with the synth machines. :(

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
