Maybe I'm showing my age here, but 20 or so years ago 1mb of ram in a sampler was considered a luxury, people made great records with this, nowadays I think if you can't make decent tracks on something like the MD or OT, well maybe its not the tools that are the problem.

I find it kind of funny people on forums demanding to be 'convinced' or impressed by the Octatrack, like anything else it only does what you make it do. It seems like some people are always waiting for the next great thing that will make a difference to their music.

I think these type of people - and some of them have owned Elektron products in the past - will, if they get one, sell it shortly after. Because they are the same people who say the MD is cold etc.
