Yes, do have 2 sets of stereo outputs (master and cue) and if you really want, they can be used seperate.. and yes, if you pan 1 track to the left.. and the other track to the right.. you should have 2 mono outputs..

One thing I've learned about it is that it's better to go into it with an open mind.

Let the OT teach you, and once you're comfortable using it, everything will come easily.

As opposed to learning it while trying to accomplish some preconceived notion of how you want it to work; which can be frustrating, and in my opinion, not an effective way to learn how to use it.

I have a friend who bought one, it was his first piece of hardware. He loves it, but his idea was to buy it and start using it to perform live his album that he'd made in Ableton. This can be done in any number of different ways, but it's a hell of a way to learn the machine. I think he struggled with making it work for him, after doing everything on a computer before that. My suggestion to him was to just have fun with it, start some new stuff from scratch, just play around, learn all the

features and functions so that you're able to move through it quickly. Then when you look back, after knowing how the
machine "thinks" it'll be a piece of cake to get it to do what you "think."

That's great advice, thank you.

Ultimately that's what I would hope to do. I use logic mostly to multitrack my gear, and do final editing/mixing but I would like to take the parts from my tracks and plug them into the octatrack to use as a sampler when I play live. Due to the output limitation of the octatrack I will probably just use it for samples of core parts of tracks then accent those samples with synths/drum machines.
