Kit setup (MD) inspired by TR-909 Posted by MK7 - 2013/02/24 14:26

I found the perfect kit setup when using the MD as a pure, straight-forward drum machine like a TR-909 or Jomox XBase. At least my impression is that I found the perfect setup, and therefore I would like to share it. In the past, I'd been using the MD for melodies, RAM sampling etc. as well (--> Starting Smoothly set, DL section), but now I have the A4 for melodies and RAM sampling is too "dangerous" due to possible feedback given that I enter a lot of trigs live, sometimes almost randomly.

Basically, I read the TR-909's manual, was convinced that the track layout is very useful and then thought about how this could be translated to the MD. On the TR-909, the main instruments get two buttons each, one with accent, one without: Kick accent, Kick no accent, snare accent, snare no accent, low tom accent, low tom no accent, mid tom accent ..., and then rimshot, clap, hihats. This concept is a lot more useful than the MD's accent concept! But due to the MD's flexibility, it can be realized with layered sounds.

So here it comes:

Track number, instrument type, mute position, trig position, panning
1, BD (in my case a midi machine, jomox mbase), -, 2, 0

15, RC, 14 (ok this deviates from the 909, but sounds nicer), -, +5

16, CC, -, -, +10

Try it out, it's really easy to enter new grooves with nice sound variations, even in Classic mode!

If 2-3 tracks are needed for other purposes, I'd recommend using tracks 7-8, 16.

Now I'm gonna search for a configuration software so that it doesn't take too long to modify/replace all my kits:)

I've been using 8P a lot lately, part of the reason is to remind myself of what parameters should be tweaked in a live setting, and avoids the guesswork. The only thing I wished you could do is alter a "CTL All" parameter with a "CTL 8P" knob assignment. This would keep me from doing any menu diving while jamming:)

Hey man, I thought MK7s explanation was pretty good. Most of the drum sounds occupy 2 tracks. The first drum sound is considered the accented sound, because it will sound itself and trigger the sound on the next step (layered). If you wanted an non-accented sound you would just use the 2nd track of that sound.
so track 1 BD is the accented bass drum track because it will trigger track 2. If you make a sequence with the track 2, it will only sound itself and not trigger track 1.
The mutes are just used to stop the tails of sounds, so closed hi-hat sounds will mute open hi-hat sounds.

It took me a little while to build this kit. I was having trouble layering the drum sounds, I was getting phase cancellations and such, until one day I decided to try and offset the tuning of the second drum hit be a couple of cents. All of the sudden, the drums didnt' cancel eachother, and the sound seemed a little fatter:)

I really like the sound of the kit, the only caveat is your using up your 16 tracks pretty quickly. I decided to forgo one of the tom sounds in favor of having an accented and un-accented CH, and I left the last machine for either a control 8P or control All machine.

Thx! Slight detuning, that's how I solved that issue as well.

I also sacrificed some tom tracks for other stuff, well, for real analog toms from my Jomox Mbrane. Track 5: MID machine to control the mbrane, track 6: RAM recording with non-zero cue out so that the mbrane can be heard, track 7: RAM playback with weird trigs, track 8: RAM playback of another RAM sample. For each drum kit, I store 3 versions: (1) tracks 6/7 assigned to RAM slot 1, track 8 to slot 2, (2) tracks 6/7 assigned to RAM slot 2, track 8 to slot 1, (3) tom samples as usual/described in this thread. This plus a bunch of standardized samplebanks, and you get a lot of variety.

Btw, I used just 9 kits (3 different kits with the described 3 variants each), 3 samplebanks and not more than 16 patterns (plus some live programming) for our 90 minutes live set last week and it was completely sufficient! I had a lot more available, but didn't even need to think about using it. A bunch of those kits like you posted is all you need, then it's time to stick deeper into the A4, program some macros etc.

Hello Moritz, Once again great advice. This month I'm going to focus on making some more kits for the MDUW. Than when I have some kits I'm happy with, I'm going to focus on making some more pad synths on the A4. I'm relatively happy with the 303ish bass synths I've whipped up, they suit my music well, but I could use a bit more pads & string sounding synths.
For the macros, I have a sort of system that seems to work okay. I use the 1st 4 knobs on the top row to control the volume of each synth. I use the lower 4 knobs for 303 like tweaking on the 1st 2 synths, the right most knobs I use for global tweaking such as pitch drops or reverb swells. The global tweaking parameters can change, but the first 8 knobs I sort of keep consistent, as most my tracks have two acid lines.

Hello Pixelife, Using non purchased samples is my plan. My issue is the tom sounds, in order to get them sounding right need to layer 3 sounds - 2 toms (as mentioned in this thread) and a noise generator. It'll sound fine, but I will be in need of additional tracks. I suppose what I could do is create a tom sound with a noise generator, sample it with a RAM machine, store it as a ROM sound, use that as the base sound, use the ROM sample twice, and offset the 2nd hit by a couple cents. It does seem like a fair bit of work when I have the bought 808 sounds;)

EDIT *** when using ROM samples, adjusting the pitch knob by 1 unit may cause some issues, as the pitch variance is quite great with ROM samples I believe each 3 units is a semitone. I thickened up the sound with the ROM samples by adding an EOG to a slightly different frequency for the 2 sounds, this solved the phase cancellation problem with the ROM samples.

I tried out another kit, as per Moritz's template. This one is almost exclusively machinedrum sounds (with the exception of the RC & RS). I like the sound of the RC on the TRX machine, but I'm not happy that pitch can't be changed. This is something I like to tweak in my songs, so I use an 808 RC sample. The rim shot is a 909 sample. I've struggled with the TOMS in the past, but I'm happy with the sounds of these, there EFM toms, with heavy filtering at BRR to make them a little crunchy. On their own their not great, but I think they sit well in the mix.

Thanks again for the tips. Regarding the SRR. I've been using these on the Snare & Tom sounds (with varying degrees). With the KD, it causes a bit too much noise (but not in a good way). On my previous kit, it was the SRR (& some severe filtering) that allowed me to get some crunchy toms that I actually liked.

The cool thing about these kits is everyday I change a little something on each one. Sometimes the layering requires a pretty elaborate system. Other times layering 2 identical sounds with just an EOG in a different frequency seems to do the trick.

Thanks again for your tutorial/post Moritz. I had no idea making drum kits could be so much fun.
