Hello,

I am planning to drive Reason 3 from the MIDI tracks of my Monomachine. In order to simplify setup and not have to use a mixer, I want to run the output of Reason into an Input FX machine on Track 5, and run the entire mix of all tracks through a Dynamix FX machine running on Track 6:

Track 1: Inst A

Track 2: Inst B

Track 3: Inst C

Track 4: Inst D

Track 5: Input FX (Reason master output)

Track 6: Dynamix FX (input bus AB, where tracks 1-5 are outputting on bus AB)

I will be able to control the overall level and character of the sound by using this schema, but I'm not very experienced with either compressors generally or the Dynamix specifically, so I am looking for some discussion of ramifications of my plan that haven't occurred to me.

I'll be able to map some interesting track parameters to the joystick on Track 6, thus being able to do some radical timbre shifts on the whole mix at one time. DJ-style EQ kills, anyone? Niiiiice.

It depends on what sort of stuff you're sending to the MnM from reason. If it's a few tracks of drums, routing the master bus through the dynamix would be great. But if you have, for example, a drum track together with a pad sound, you might not be thrilled with the pumping that could occur...or maybe that's the sound you're going for. So how good of an idea this is depends on what you're sending on the reason mix, and what kind of dynamics artifacts you like.

Well, the Mono is not a VA, so that doesn't suprise me.

You need to put a trig on step 1 on your FX track, and set DEC and REL to 127 to keep the gate open.

I'm still getting up to speed on the Evo. Once I have, say 5-10 good sequences, I'll hook it up to the Mono.

how is the mono not a VA in your opinion? Are any waveforms generated in an analog manner? I am fairly sure that the Saw, and GND, and SID are emulations of analog - therefore VA, no?

However, the filter design is decidedly unlike any analog filter you will see - so in that respect, the mono is quite different.

Saying the Roland V-synth blows the mono away on the other hand would be enough to trigger a spit-take and spray water all over the table. I have heard the V-synth and I thought it was a joke - besides the point that its COMPLETELY different than the monomachine!!! Apples and elephants.

What I was specifically referring to is the Monomachine is not advertised as a VA synth. The Virus, Supernova, Nord Lead, etc. are marketed this way. The Mono is a VA in as much as it has the SuperWave and GND machines, but I think that's where the VA concept ends.

You are entirely correct about the Mono's filter design being unlike a traditional VA synth. Although the Mono's filter is

simple, I find it to be flexible and, above all, musical.
So yeah, the Mono does VA, but it does much more. Neener neener;)
