hello - and welcome to the board!

Firstly, I must admit that I do not have the UW, but I can tell you a thing or 2 about the nature of the elektron workflow. Basically, there is none - you have to invent the workflow. Elektron kind of makes these amazing boxes and then throws their hands in the air and says "you do it" and what I think they mean by that is that we can control the workflow any way we wish simply by using the machines and integrating them into our existing kit.

The Machinedrum can do whatever the hell you want it to do - but the best way to learn how to do this (the manual is like the legend on a map - its a rough guide for how the OS works and thats about it) is to just spend time with the thing and expiriment. When I first got my monomachine, I was like "what the hell is this thing?!?!" it was nothing like any of my other gear, and I almost did not even like it. Then I spent more and more time just digging into the thing, and soon I realized that it leaves my other gear in the dust because its beyond sophistication. The workflow is dictated by my new understading of the machine, mostly based on expirimentation.

So, if I had the UW - I would just load a bunch of random samples into it, mangle them and parameter lock them to death. Hook it up to the rest of the kit (turntables and MPC in your case) and just tweak for hours trying out new features etc. Use the inputs, the various outputs - run the thing into itself, run it off an aux of your mixer, run the MPC into it - run it into the MPC - route that signal all over the place and find your flow! You; Il have the hang of it soon enough :- D

Also, the tap tempo (function+tempo) and nudge functions (in tempo mode, push left or right keys) make the MD pretty easy to beatmatch w/ records.

Once you're looked onto the tempo of your tunes, you could drop sounds by pressing the trig buttons, or start programming patterns on top in real time . . . As mentioned above, workflow is pretty flexible.

Everytime I jam on the MD and play w/ a different function or effect, I learn something new (and often musically useful)!

sounds like you're after the RAM machines. these capture live audio and allow you to resequence/tweak/effect/filter/chop/pitch it. You can sample from either of the audio inputs (or a mix of the two, but only in mono), or resample the MD's output. For DJ work I imagine you'd be more interested in sampling the inputs. The way that recording works with the RAM record machines may be a little different from what you're used to, and by that, I mean completely ass-different. You will set up one pattern with a REC machine trigger (set length param to the entire pattern). Make sure the MD is synced to tempo at this point. Let the record pattern play, each loop it will capture one measure worth of sound. When you record the measure that you want, switch to your RAM play pattern (which you set up beforehand). Of course, this pattern will sound totally different depending on what you fed the RAM record with. Make sure you use lots of parameter locks with the RAM play machine...you can use it as a simple phrase sampler, I guess, but that would be a grave injustice.

edit: to clarify: the ram record machine will sample audio whenever it is triggered in a pattern...the MD itself doesn't have to be in record mode for this to work. You can even live-trigger the RAM machine if you want (I think).

Note: this is just the most basic, off-the-top-of-my-head way to use this thing. I certainly haven't begun to scratch the surface of the full potential of the RAM machines myself.

I guess matching a measure to a pattern just got a lot easier. I'll need to try some of these things, and make sure to learn the idea of working those RAM-machine properly. I've had some trouble getting parameter locks to work for me, but I'll get around to it.
